Scouting this trail will take you through a land of rolling hills, majestic mountains, sweeping grasslands and winding rivers. In the 1860's the Blue and the Gray pushed each other back and forth across these lands. Today, the whispers of the past linger, and one can drink in the over-whelming sense of their story in these historic towns.

Today swords and cannons have given way to vines, and barrels. The Northern Virginia wine region is a remarkable and active wine region. A wonderful way to get acquainted is to savor the wines of the wineries that make up the General's Wine & History Trail. You'll find a variety of delicious, hand-crafted wines and that unique quality of "*terroir*" – the special relationship between a wine and where it is grown – that is so prized in the old world and so seldom found outside of it these days.

Bluemont Vineyard

Bluemont Vineyard is nestled on an eastern slope of the Blue Ridge Mountains just minutes from Leesburg, Middleburg and surrounding towns. While enjoying the exceptional wines, you can take in the spectacular panoramic views from the tasting room high above the Virginia countryside (951 feet above sea level) boasting clear views of Tysons Corner, Reston, and Dulles. The goal at Bluemont Vineyard is to offer a unique experience. Elevation is the key word around here, because at Bluemont Vineyard, we aspire to raise your spirits while you, your friends, and or family enjoy our wine and hospitality. We are excited to be a part of the Virginia winemaking tradition, and we look forward to becoming a destination spot for the General's Wine Trail. A truly unique experience awaits you in Bluemont where elevation not only defines our location, but also our goal.

Directions from Washington

Take the Dulles Toll Road (267) West

At the end of the Toll Road, bearing left onto Route 7 West Go 16 miles on Route 7 West, passing the towns of Purcellville & Round Hill As you start up the mountain, turn left onto Route 760 (Clayton Hall Road) into the town of Bluemont Take the first left onto Snickersville Turnpike Take the first right onto Foggy Bottom Road. We are 1/2 mile on the right.

History Near Bluemont Vineyard

Bluemont, VA After two brief engagements at Heaton's Crossroads (Purcellville) and Woodgrove on July 16, 1864, Lt. Gen. Jubal Early's main force crossed the Blue Ridge Mountains at Snickers Gap and established themselves in the environs of Berryville. On July 17, the Union cavalry passed through Snickers Gap and unsuccessfully attempted to force passage of the Shenandoah River at Castleman's Ferry.

Cool Spring On July 18, Gens. Crook and Wright arrived at Snickers Gap and determined to attack what they mistakenly thought was a light picket line of Confederates along the river, left to cover Early's retreat up the Valley. The battle at Cool Spring was a Confederate victory. Wright had sent a small force against a well reinforced Confederate position without the aid of cavalry because he mistakenly assumed it was only the pickets of Early's rearguard. Thoburn's force paid dearly for the mistake. Still, Thoburn's judicious use of terrain and lack of coordination on the Confederate side allowed Thoburn to stave off a full routing of his troops and thus was able to minimize his casualties. The following day both armies remained in the same positions as the night before and engaged in little fighting.

Directions to site

Bottom of the drive turn left. First Left onto Foggy Bottom
First Left onto Snickersville Turnpike to Bluemont
Continue to Route 7. Take Route 7 West. Make a right turn
immediately after crossing the Shenandoah River onto Route
603 (Castleman's Road). After one mile turn right on Cool
Spring Lane.

Gadino Cellars

“Piacere!” - We are pleased to meet you! Slip away for a few hours to the quiet and beautiful countryside of Rappahannock County, VA and become part of Gadino Cellars *La Famiglia*. Relax with an assortment of fine wines, gourmet cheeses and local sausage in an Italian-inspired tasting room or on the sun-splashed deck overlooking the gardens, the vineyards and the enchanting Blue Ridge Mountains.

Our grandfathers emigrated from Italy in the early 1900's and brought with them the custom of making wine for family and neighbors. Those rustic and often robust wines-and the passion and home-grown skill that infused them-were an essential part of our daily lives. As children, we were permitted a small glass during Sunday and holiday meals. The love of a glass of wine to enhance good food and family congeniality was instilled in both of us at an early age.

The winery is perfectly located between the historic towns of “Little” Washington and Sperryville, which feature many enticing B&B's.

Directions from Washington

Take Rt. 66 West to exit 43A - Route 29S toward Gainesville/Warrenton. After entering Warren turn right on Rt. 211W toward Shenandoah National Park. Travel approx. 23 miles to Rt. 636 - School House Rd (2.5 miles past Washington, VA.) Turn left onto School House Rd. and follow past the elementary school continuing left past the ball fields 1/2 mile to Gadino Cellars at 92 School House Rd.

History Near Gadino Cellars

Sperryville, VA is the site of the “Sperryville Outrage” of July 16, 1862. Three men of Battery 1 of the First New York Light Artillery rampaged through the home of a widow, Mrs. Swindler and attacked a maidservant. The Union Army promptly (July 22nd) court-martialed the culprits. Today Sperryville houses excellent antiques shops.

Washington, VA Nearby is the lovely village of Washington, VA - home to the famous “Inn at Little Washington”.

The historic Middleton Inn B&B, was built in 1840 by Middleton Miller who manufactured and designed the Confederate uniform during the Civil War. During the Civil War, a home on the town's Main Street served as a Confederate Hospital. In its history, Heritage House Bed and Breakfast, a 1837 manor house, also served as Confederate headquarters to Civil War General Jubal Early.

Directions to site

At end of School House Road turn right.

Travel 2.3 miles to Little Washington. On Main Street come 1 block to Heritage House on Right.

Lost Creek Vineyard & Winery

Family owned and operated, Lost Creek Winery & Vineyards was planted in 2001 on 52 acres. Lost Creek Winery & Vineyards is the passion of Bob and Carol Hauck. "Owning a vineyard has been a life-long passion." Growing up in a largely Italian neighborhood, Bob found himself "helping everyone in the neighborhood make wine." So in 1995, he and his wife Carol purchased 52 acres and began building their dream. Within a year they started planting vines and by 2001 they produced their very first vintage. When visiting the Winery you will be welcomed by a warm family atmosphere and some of Virginia's finest wines.

Whether you are a wine enthusiast, new to wine drinking, a tourist, or just passing through, you will find something to enjoy in the wines, the cozy tasting room, the outdoor patio and the light gourmet fare. One can also find local products, arts and crafts.

Directions from Washington

We suggest taking I-66 West to the Dulles Toll Road (Route 267). (Alternately, you may access the Dulles Toll Road from I-495, The Capital Beltway). Continue past Dulles Airport through the toll gates to the Dulles Greenway (toll required). Continue to the end of the Greenway (approximately 13 miles), and take the Route 15 North exit. Follow the directions coming from the south, above.

History Near Lost Creek Vineyard & Winery

Leesburg, VA The Battle of Ball's Bluff, initiated by a telegram from Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan, commander of U.S. armies in the Washington area, to Maj. Gen. George P. Stone, commander of troops along the Potomac River in Maryland. McClellan told Stone to "keep a good lookout upon Leesburg, to see if this movement (several Union reconnaissance's) has the effect to drive them (Confederate forces) away. Perhaps a slight demonstration on your part would have the effect to move them."

During the Battle of Ball's Bluff (October 21, 1861) many local men of the 8th Va. were casualties. Wounded on both sides were placed in homes and public buildings. Union prisoners were held on the courthouse lawn. Cavalry corporal Elijah V. White, a local farmer, engineered the capture of 350 Union soldiers. Casualties' were 1071; mostly on the Union side and 700 Union troops were captured. The battle was on the banks of the Potomac between VA and MD. Today, visitors can see one of the country's smallest National Cemeteries. A visit to Balls Bluff Battlefield Regional Park is time well spent.

Directions to site

Head West on Spinks Ferry Rd toward Chapel Ln/VA-661.

Turn left at US-15.

Turn left at Battlefield Pkwy NE

Philip Carter Winery

Something wonderful is repeating itself at Philip Carter Winery. 1,800 grapevines are being planted in the vineyard. What is so special about the planting of these 1,800 vines, you ask? There are few places, few historic sites that can boast the depth of history that this number reflects, for it is the very same number of grapevines planted by plantation owner, Charles Carter, 250 years ago.

Philip Carter Winery (formerly Stillhouse Vineyards) is under new ownership and has a new name to commemorate Charles Carter's dream for winemaking in Virginia. Carter family at one time owned over 300,000 acres and built numerous estate homes in Virginia, many of which remain as historic landmarks today.

In 1762 Charles Carter sent the Royal Society a dozen bottles of his wine. The society awarded Carter a gold medal as the first person to make a "spirited attempt towards the accomplishment of their views, respecting wine in America."

Today, visitors to Philip Carter Winery are invited to view an authentic replica of the 1762 gold medal and enjoy today's premium wines that are being produced. Celebrate the 247th Anniversary of the first internationally recognized fine wines in America, and discover the first Family of American Wine.

Directions from Washington

Take I-66 West to Exit 18 (Markham)

Take a left at end of exit ramp.

Cross State Road 55, take right at the stop sign.

Continue on 688 for 3.6 miles, and take a left on Stillhouse Road Entrance is on the right.

History Near Philip Carter Winery

Hume, VA The present village of Hume, Virginia was known as Barbee's Crossroads in the mid 19th century, after Joseph Barbee, who leased the land from Denny Fairfax in 1787. The village was at the north end of the Leeds Manor Turnpike which was incorporated in 1848. The center of the village is at the corner of Leeds of Manor Road (Route 688) and Hume Road (Route 635), formerly known as the "Crossroads."

Later the village was named for the Hume family. At one time, the village had 3 stores and 4 blacksmiths; a 4th store existed later. There were very large cattle farms in the surrounding areas, which employed many families. During the Civil War, the wounded from the battles of Manassas were taken to Barbee's Crossroads. The Leed's Church (Episcopal) was occupied at different times by both Union and Confederate soldiers. As a result of nearby fighting, the church walls were pierced by a shell which exploded within the church, damaging the interior. In 1873, the church burned and was rebuilt.

Directions to site

Head West on Stillhouse Rd/VA-730 toward Leeds Manor Rd/VA-688

Turn left at Leeds Manor Rd/VA-688

Fox Meadow Winery

A visit to Fox Meadow Winery is a “taste of the country.” The Motto of the winery is “Great Wines, Great Views, and Great Times.”

Five years ago we visited the area, and fell in love with Northern Virginia. We visited some of the local wineries and realized that great wines can be crafted here! After an exhausting search, we found the parcel of land which is now known as Fox Meadow Vineyards. Fox Meadow was once part of Freezeland Orchards, which was almost 100 years old. We could immediately see the potential of this location. It had great possibilities!

The winery is located atop a 1700 foot elevation on top of Blue Mountain. The barrel Room at Fox Meadow Winery continues to grow with the addition of this year's barrel shipments. The winery uses barrels made from both American oak from Missouri and Pennsylvania and French oak from Allier, Troncais and Vosges forests as part of our continued commitment to increasing the quality of our wines.

Directions from Washington

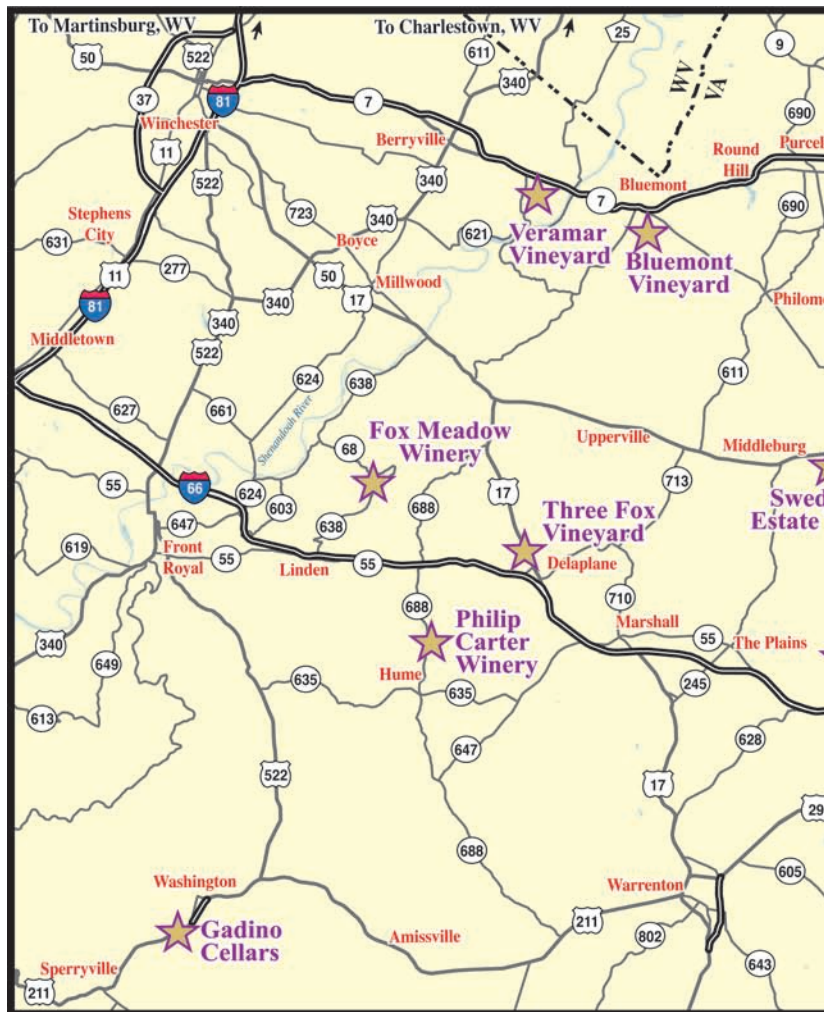
I-66 West traveling from Washington DC. Exit at the Markham exit (#18), turn left and proceed 200 feet to the stop sign. Turn right on Rt. 55 and proceed 4.1 miles west to Linden. Turn right on Rt. 638 - Freezeland Road and proceed 3 miles up the hill to Fox Meadow Vineyards on the right.

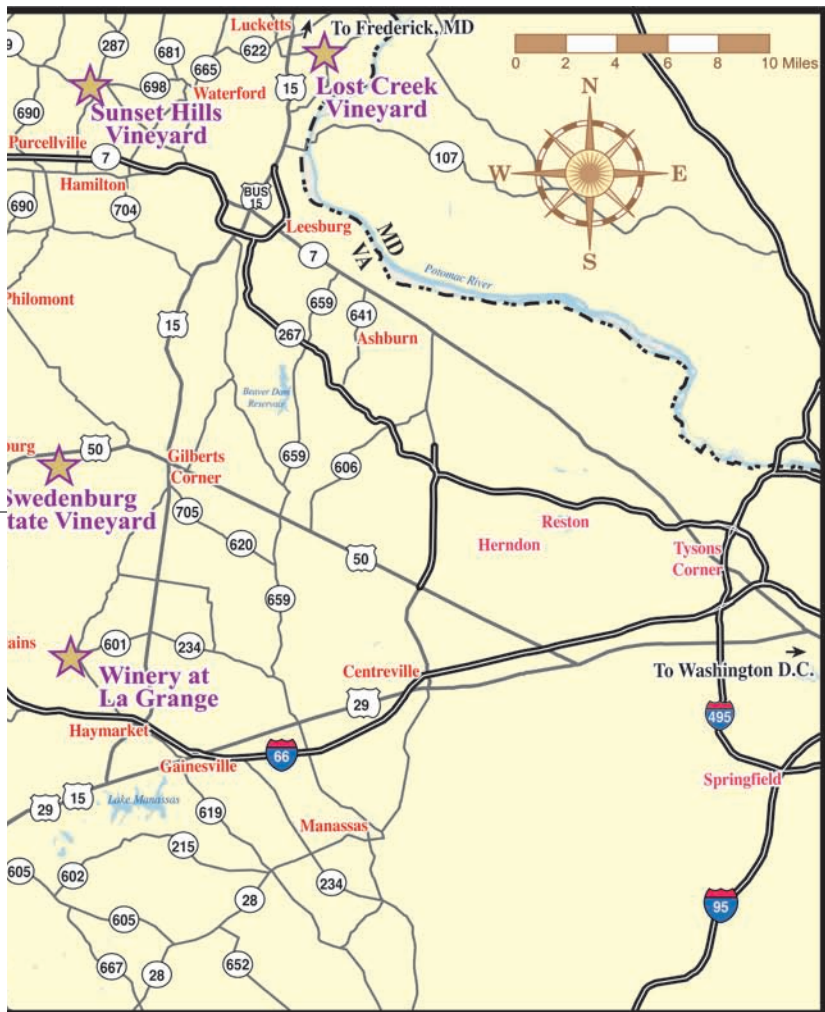
History Near Fox Meadow Winery

Front Royal, VA In the historic town of Front Royal is the Belle Boyd Museum. **Maria Isabella Boyd**, best known as **Belle Boyd**, was a Confederate spy in the American Civil War. She operated from her father's hotel in Front Royal, Virginia, and provided valuable information to Confederate generals Ashby and Stonewall Jackson during the 1862 Valley Campaign. Boyd played what was, at the time, widely considered to be a man's role in a time when women were more or less confined to the domestic sphere. She was not a feminist in the modern sense but her bravery and accomplishments represent a legacy from which lessons can be learned. Far from compromising her femininity, she made use of it to pursue her espionage activities. This challenges the claim that women who perform what some regard as male tasks forfeit their gender-specificness. Visit Belle Boyd Cottage to learn more about Belle's life. The cottage 101 Chester Street Front Royal, VA 22630 has been restored as a living history museum depicting Warren County during the Civil War. A guided tour is provided Mon-Fri.

Directions to site

Head Southwest on Freezeland Rd/VA-638 toward Indian Lookout Way. Turn right at Tomahawk Way. Turn left at Old Linden Rd. Turn left at High Top Rd. Turn right at Freezeland Rd/VA-638. Turn left to stay on Freezeland Rd/VA-638. Turn right at VA-55. Turn right at S Commerce Ave/US-522. Turn left at E Main St. Turn right at Chester St





Sunset Hills Vineyard

The newly built tasting room is gorgeous to say the least, and housed in a meticulously restored multi-level circa 1870's, stone and oak barn - truly a fine mix of charm and rustic elegance. The tasting room is large and comfortable with a wrap-around mahogany tasting bar and offers a welcoming atmosphere. On warmer days, enjoy a bottle of wine and a cheese platter on the multi-level outdoor deck and bask in the glorious views of Hillsborough Gap, back-dropped by the Blueridge Mountains. For the cooler months, savor a glass of wine in the attractive and spacious tasting room. Tall 35-foot ceilings, restored hardwood floors, up-stairs and down-stairs seating, wi-fi, winery tours, and picture windows overlooking the vineyard, are just some of the niceties offered.

Sunset Hills Vineyard produces award winning wines from a historic farm. Our winery is in a relaxing and pastoral setting with panoramic views of the Blueridge and Short Hill Mountain ranges. Our Amish-restored 130 year old barn, with two story decks, spring house and corn crib offer a beautiful sunset view of the valley leading back to Leesburg.

Directions from Washington

Follow 267 (Dulles Toll Road) to Leesburg, then take Route 7 West

At Purcellville exit take 287 north.

History Near Sunset Hills Vineyard

Waterford, VA The Fight at the Baptist Church, Waterford, 1862
This war is thought of as one of brother against brother, but seldom did it really happen - here it did.

In 1861, the Catoctin Mountains separated the areas of sentiment just as sharply as it divided the freestone soil of the Catoctin Valley from the limestone region of the valley adjoining the Potomac River. This low mountain range also separated the homes of two men who would contribute much to the history of a divided County: Elijah V. White, successful farmer of the eastern side, and Samuel Means, prosperous miller, from the western slope. Means had received rumors that enemy forces were in the neighborhood and had placed pickets on all roads leading into the town. The night of the 26th, after checking his command, Means retired to his home in town, leaving Lieutenant Luther Slater in command of the Rangers at the church.

Captain White's party eluded Means' pickets by crossing fields until they reached the Hollingsworth barn on the outskirts of Waterford; there White planned his attack. Twenty dismounted men under Captain Randolph were ordered to march down the road and enter the church before firing.

Directions to site

Head West on Fremont Overlook Ln toward Berlin Turnpike/VA-287 Turn right at Berlin Turnpike/VA-287. Turn right at Charles Town Pike/VA-9 Turn left at Back Rd/Hamilton Station Rd/VA-704. Turn left at Clarkes Gap Rd
Turn left at Clarkes Gap Rd/Factory St/VA-662
Continue to follow Clarkes Gap Rd

Swedenburg Estate Vineyard

Swedenburg Winery is located on Historic Valley View Farm (c. 1762). Wayne and Juanita Swedenburg, came to this farm in 1978, both on the heels of retirement from government service. Along with their son Marc, the Swedenburgs planted the entire vineyard, mostly by hand, sometimes by the light of the family pickup truck at night! After many years of hard work, the family enjoyed the first "crush" in 1987, and have been producing fine wines ever since!

The farm is, still, however, also a working farm! The transition from the 18th century to the 21st continues, ever melding the old and new. Producing quality wines and farm products in harmony with Mother Nature is always our goal. Guests are invited to come, relax and experience the wines along with the beauty of Virginia. The wine-making is continuously evolving through the many contributions of professionals and friends that provide assistance and guidance. Our family focuses on making very small quantities of wine around 1,000 to 1,500 cases annually. Wayne was quoted as saying, "We make enough wine for the family with a little left over to sell." Only 40 minutes from the Washington beltway yet a world away!

Directions from Washington

Take I-66 West to US Rt. 50 West. Drive 21 miles to the entrance for Valley View Farm. Turn left into Valley View Farm/Swedenburg Winery.

History Near Swedenburg Estate Vineyard

Middleburg, VA From June 17-19, 1863 General J.E.B. Stuart, screening Lee's invasion route, sparred with Pleasonton's cavalry. On the June 17, Col. Alfred Duffie's isolated 1st Rhode Island Cavalry Regiment was attacked by the brigades of Munford and Robertson. The 1st Rhode Island Cavalry was routed, taking about 250 casualties. On June 19, J. Irvin Gregg's brigade advanced, driving Stuart's cavalry one mile beyond the town. Both sides were reinforced and mounted and dismounted skirmishing continued. Stuart was gradually levered out of his position but fell back to a second ridge, still covering the approaches to the Blue Ridge gap.

Nearby Middleburg is chock full of Civil War history. Check out the lower bar at the Red Fox Inn, which doubled as a field hospital surgery table at the time! This 1728 tavern has been visited by George Washington, General Jeb Stuart, Colonel John Mosby and his famous Mounted Rangers, and, in more recent times, President Kennedy, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, Ambassador Pamela Harriman and Elizabeth Taylor.

Directions to site

At end of Driveway turn left on route 50
Go 1 mile to downtown Middleburg.
Red Fox Inn on your left by traffic light

Three Fox Vineyards

Enjoy *La Dolce Vita* at Three Fox Vineyards, a bit of Tuscany in Virginia! On 50 rolling acres in the historic Crooked Run Valley you can relax and enjoy life! Directions from Washington

Route 66 West, exit at Delaplane (exit 23) and take Route 17 north for about 1 mile. After you cross the railroad tracks, take an immediate left onto Three Fox Lane. Over the little bridge and keep right, up the hill past the Three Foxes and the tasting room is on the right.

History Near Three Fox Vineyards

Upperville, VA 1863 “As we ride through the high road, it is mournful to see the heaps of dead blue and gray...How hard it seems for us strangers to kill these young men in sight of the cottages where some of them were raised, fighting, as they believe themselves to be, for their friends. “Thus passes a Sunday in war.”

Deleplane, VA General Stonewall Jackson had marched his troops from Winchester to the Piedmont Station train depot. The antique store across from Three Fox's entrance was, during the Civil War, the train station (or Piedmont Station) - as Delaplane was known at the time. This is where trains were used for the first time in history to move troops to impending battle.

Here, in 1861, Stonewall Jackson loaded his troops onto railroad cars to get them to the 1st Battle of Manassas. Imagine thousands of his soldiers waiting on the banks of the stream, Crooked Run!

Directions to site

At end of Driveway turn right and before going over railroad track turn left to the Train station antique store.

Veramar Vineyard

Escape from the city to the quiet elegance of Veramar Vineyard, a 100-acre private estate & winery in the heart of Virginia's wine country just 55 minutes from Washington D.C. Sip International acclaimed Virginia wines while listening to soft jazz, surrounded by the beauty of the Blue Ridge Mountains. We are a family-run winery & vineyard dedicated to producing full-bodied Virginia wines that are distinctly elegant and powerful while representing the best of our Virginia Terroir. We invite you to taste our wines and stroll our grounds.

Veramar Vineyard is comfortably ensconced at the end of a quiet country road. From its Italian-Mediterranean architecture to its cheerful garden patio, this family winery exhibits a charm you'd be hard-pressed to find anywhere else in the area. There is practically no event that this versatile venue can't handle. Corporate dinners, private parties, seminars and family bashes keep this family winery hopping all year long. Veramar's Fountain Court yard is immediately adjacent to the winery itself. Pass through the green gates, and you'll find yourself in the courtyard with a dramatic view of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Directions from Washington

Follow 267 (Dulles Toll Road) to Leesburg, then take Route 7 West. After crossing the Shenandoah River, turn left onto Route 612 or Quarry Road. Veramar Vineyard will be on the left.

History Near Veramar Vineyard

Berryville, VA General Robert E. Lee's visit to Berryville, Virginia
"God be with you!"

It was a fleeting interlude of peace on the road to war. In long columns of gray and butternut, General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia tramped northward in late June of 1863.

Lee's route of march took him and a large portion of his army through the tiny Shenandoah Valley village of Berryville, Virginia. Central landmarks in the hamlet were the county courthouse and Grace Episcopal Church. It was Sunday morning, June 21, 1863, and General Lee took the opportunity to halt and attend Sunday morning services at the church.

Lee left church at Berryville prepared to face a fierce and uncertain future. "God be with you," was the era's common benediction to believers. This would be the last time that Lee would have the opportunity to worship in a church before his fateful date with destiny at Gettysburg. I like to think that his brief moment of worship and prayer in Berryville helped give Lee the strength to face the ordeal that lay ahead.

Directions to site

Leave Veramar Vineyard continue on Route 7 West to Route 7 business via Downtown Berryville. At Traffic Light turn right, proceed to end of block to Grace Episcopal Church.

The Winery at La Grange

Very rich in history and very rich in wine, The Winery at La Grange opened September 2006 as Prince William County's only established winery. The historic red brick, three and a half story La Grange manor house, built in the 1790's, now houses the tasting rooms and the winery itself is situated behind the manor house. Research evidenced that La Grange is rich in history; it had been originally carved out of Robert "King" Carter's Bull Run Tract in the 1600s and later became known as La Grange. The property's ownership changed many times during the past four centuries. The farm's acreage size increased and decreased during those years. Fortunately the three story red brick manor house built by George Green survived. There are 5,500 Cabernet Sauvignon vines growing on the estate and wine is aging in the winery. The Winery at La Grange's current inventory of 5,500 cases of wine include: Pinot Gris, Chardonnay, Viognier, Rosé of Merlot, Cuvee Blanc, Norton, Cabernet Franc, Merlot, Meritage, Tannat, Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon and a Port styled wine called Snort.

Directions from Washington

Take I-66 West. Exit at Haymarket (Exit 40). Turn left at the top of the exit onto US-15 South. Go to the second traffic light and turn right on VA- 55. Just under 1 mile, turn at first right onto Antioch Road. The winery will be about 3 miles North on Antioch Road, entrance on the Left.

History Near The Winery at La Grange

The Plains, VA Chapman's Mill, or as it is frequently called, Beverley's Mill, was believed to be the tallest gristmill in the United States and was built of stone in 1742 by Jonathan and Nathaniel Chapman in Thoroughfare Gap.

Sharpshooters from both sides would use the five-story Beverley's Mill (then Chapman's Mill) to attack or defend the pass. On August 28, 1862 the Battle of Thoroughfare Gap took place in and around the mill. Northern troops tried to prevent Generals Lee and Longstreet from marching through the Gap, from the west, to join other Confederate forces gathering for the Second Battle of Manassas. Their failure to stop the Confederates directly contributed to the southern victory of the Second Battle of Manassas.

Directions to site

At driveway turn right on Antioch road at Rt. 55 to turn right to Turner Rd. Turn right on Turner Rd. You'll drive over I-66 and make an immediate left onto Beverley Mill Dr. and proceed about one mile (west) to the Mill entrance.
